## Jonah "Fishy Situations"

## When on the Run from God, What Should My Prayers Look Like?

- 1. My prayers should involve <u>crying out in desperate need</u> & total dependence on God.
  - Jonah 2:1-2b: "From inside the fish Jonah prayed to the Lord his God. In my distress I called to the Lord, and he answered me. From deep in the realm of the dead I called for help, and you listened to my cry."
- 2. My prayers should involve a heartfelt recognition & <u>confession of sin</u>.
  - **Jonah 2:3-4**: "You hurled me into the depths, into the very heart of the seas, and the currents swirled about me; all your waves and breakers swept over me. <sup>4</sup> I said, 'I have been banished from your sight; yet I will look again toward your holy temple."
- 3. My prayers should involve <u>claiming God's promise(s)</u>, realizing that God is rigorous with His discipline but generous with His grace.
  - **Jonah 2:5-8**: "The engulfing waters threatened me, the deep surrounded me; seaweed was wrapped around my head. <sup>6</sup> To the roots of the mountains I sank down; the earth beneath barred me in forever. But you, Lord my God, brought my life up from the pit. <sup>7</sup> When my life was ebbing away, I remembered you, Lord, and my prayer rose to you, to your holy temple. <sup>8</sup> Those who cling to worthless idols turn away from God's love for them."
- 4. My prayers should involve <u>cheering God's mercy</u>, understanding that God's correction is not designed to pay me back, but to bring me back to Him.
  - **Jonah 2:9a**: "But I, with shouts of grateful praise, will sacrifice to you."
- 5. My prayers should involve *commitments to fulfill promises* made.
  - **Jonah 2:9b-10**: "What I have vowed I will make good. I will say, 'Salvation comes from the Lord.' <sup>10</sup> And the Lord commanded the fish, and it vomited Jonah onto dry land."
